June is **Cataract Awareness Month**, and we remind you that early diagnosis and treatment can help preserve vision. By age 80, most people either have cataracts or have had cataract surgery. It is important to recognize cataract symptoms and not delay, as modern surgical treatment of cataracts is safe and can effectively restore vision.

Know the Symptoms and Treatments

A cataract is a clouding of a lens in your eye. Leading causes are age, smoking, and diabetes, with increased risk from prolonged exposure to ultraviolet sunlight and a family history of cataracts. Cataracts may also develop after other eye surgery or an eye injury.

Symptoms of cataracts include:

- Cloudy or blurry vision
- Seeing faded colors
- Glare, with headlights, lamps, or sunlight appearing too bright
- Worse vision at night
- Double vision/seeing multiple images

The early symptoms of cataracts may improve with new glasses, antiglare sunglasses, magnifying lenses, or brighter lighting. If there is not enough improvement in your vision with those options, you may benefit from surgery to remove the cloudy lens and replace it with an artificial lens.

Since 2005, Lighthouse Guild's scholarship program has awarded over \$2.7 million in scholarships to outstanding students from 39 states. Former recipients have gone on to careers as nurses, attorneys, teachers, engineers, chemists, composers, musicians, neuroscientists, social workers, business owners, investors, epidemiologists, physician assistants, physical therapists, occupational therapists, speech therapists, journalists, and computer scientists.



Latest On Tech and Vision Podcast

Check out the latest podcast episode of On Tech and Vision with Dr. Cal Roberts: **Tools for Success: Tech Convergence and Co-Designed Products Close Gaps for Children Who Are Blind**. I talk with Greg Stilson, head of Global Innovation at American Printing House for the Blind. Greg and his team are on the verge of delivering a dynamic device that instantly provides both Braille and tactile graphics — poised to fill a much-needed gap in the Braille textbook market. I also talk with Dr. Cecily Morrison, principal researcher at Microsoft Research in Cambridge, UK. Dr. Morrison and her team have developed PeopleLens, smart glasses worn on the forehead that can identify a person the user is facing, giving the user a spatial map in their mind of where people are around them. PeopleLens helps children who are blind overcome social inhibitions and engage with classmates and peers. These are crucial skills for their development and their lives.

Juan has been coming to our **GuildCare Adult Day Health Care** program for twenty years. He is 73 years old and has Glaucoma. Juan's vision slowly got worse, and he became blind. He shares that when he started coming to our program, his life changed — it made him feel better because he could socialize with others, listen to music, participate in recreational therapy, and he has made many friends.
